Recently, acclaimed composer Daniel Bernard Roumain (DBR), known for his work with artists as varied as Philip Glass, Savion Glover and Lady Gaga, teamed up with one of the most sought-after voices in creative collaborations, North Carolina singer/songwriter Laurelyn Dossett, and the two embarked on a statewide, mountains-to-coast journey. The result is a new collection of musical works that reflect the people and places of North Carolina, presented in collaboration with communities across the state. After a weeklong residency in the High Country, the award-winning creative team will perform in concert at Appalachian.

The compositions created for *Connecting Crossroads in North Carolina* are commissioned by NCSU Center Stage, Davidson College Friends of the Arts and Smith Artist Series, UNCW Presents, East Carolina University's S. Rudolph Alexander Performing Arts Series, and The Performing Arts Series at Appalachian State University. Additional support is provided by the North Carolina Arts Council, a division of the Department of Cultural Resources, with funding from the National Endowment for the Arts; and by South Arts, in partnership with the National Endowment for the Arts and the NC Arts Council.

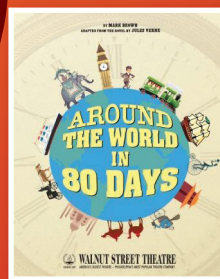
